CHAPLAIN TO THE CHAPLAINS an interview with Frank Loo

While 2021 brought a great deal of challenges to chaplains across our nation, we also witnessed some amazing advancements. One of these highlights was the appointment of Rev. Frank Loo to Provincial Chaplaincy Coordinator of the Ministry of the Solicitor General, Corrections – Institutional Services. Frank has been a chaplain in various sectors for more than 30 years and has been a strong advocate of NLPM resources. We were blessed to interview Frank to discuss this exciting new role in Ontario.

What do you love about your new role?

I love that this newly created role allows me to empower and equip chaplains across Ontario. This new scope provides a space for me to provide a spiritual lens, including my own faith tradition of Christianity as a voice in the decisions made within Corrections and it allows me to raise the profile of chaplains in Ontario. One of the highlights of my new current role is that I travel all over the province visiting various correctional institutions ministering to chaplains, providing guidance, prayer, and insight into their work.

What is the future of chaplaincy in Ontario?

I have found that government leaders see this as a vital role in the correction services system. Since Covid, the chaplain's role in Ontario is stronger and more valued than in the past. Chaplains have proven to be a strong support when handling mental wellness issues, grieving, and have been known at times to be among first responders in time of crisis. Even leaders with little to no faith background view the chaplain as a vital resource. There has been an increased surge of recognition for chaplains within Correction Services recently and I am thankful to see this support.

Why is NLPM vital to this role?

Chaplains can't do ministry alone – the demands are too great, and time is limited. NLPM is a valued community partner that provides help for the Chaplain with resources and volunteers. What is unique about NLPM is that they have the largest number of resources that respond to specific issues being faced in jail like anger, grief, abuse, and so on just to name a few. This helps chaplains extend their reach to hit touch on There has been an increased surge of recognition for chaplains within Correction Services recently and I am thankful to see this support.

topics that will help transform inmates and get them talking about their specific issue. New Life courses allow inmates to start where they need it most then move through the studies afterwards.

The value of having a volunteer instructor as an extension to the chaplain's work is life changing. They take the time to help build a relationship through feedback and letters that will encourage the inmate to get to know Jesus. The instructor truly becomes an extension of the chaplaincy office, extending our reach.

What is the impact on inmates when they are in the NLPM program?

Other than the obvious growth and transformation through Jesus, people who become NLPM students have stronger rehabilitation success and are less likely to come back to jail, due to their relationship in Jesus. For some students, the New Life course certificates are their prize possessions, they hang them in their cells and when they are released, they take them home and frame them. In addition, they build a relationship with their instructor and that is rare to them. For many inmates it's the most consistent and encouraging relationship they have. This can be life changing!



When churches closed during COVID, face to face serving opportunities were limited but our church partners still responded to the needs of prison ministry across our nation. In 2021, NLPM partnered with more than 40 churches to help transform the lives of inmates with the good news of Jesus Christ. From live stream updates, virtual instructor training, mission committee proposals and live speaking engagements; NLPM creatively shared the amazing news that God was actively working in prisons despite the limitations of the pandemic. Our church partnerships provided a way for NLPM to expand its reach into the community. The local church is vital in making sure our students have successful Christ centered lives outside of prison and we count on our church communities to welcome NLPM students once they are released. As God grows our student database, we know that he will grow our church partnerships to help with this transition. We are thankful for each church that felt called to support the work of NLPM in 2021 and that God has given us the opportunity to connect with church communities in this way.

I will be released soon, and I can't wait to find a church. I know its important to have healthy people around me, so I have a support system. Please pray that I find one that helps me.
